Accidental events. No malicious initiator.

Not only nuclear safety accidents. Any event having a major impact.

We assume that your emergency and response plans are in place.
Focus on the contribution of security (how to optimize it).

We take the “operator” perspective but involve all stakeholders.

Share your experience and lessons learned. Support your inputs by hard evidences.

Only non-sensitive information. Non-attribution findings.

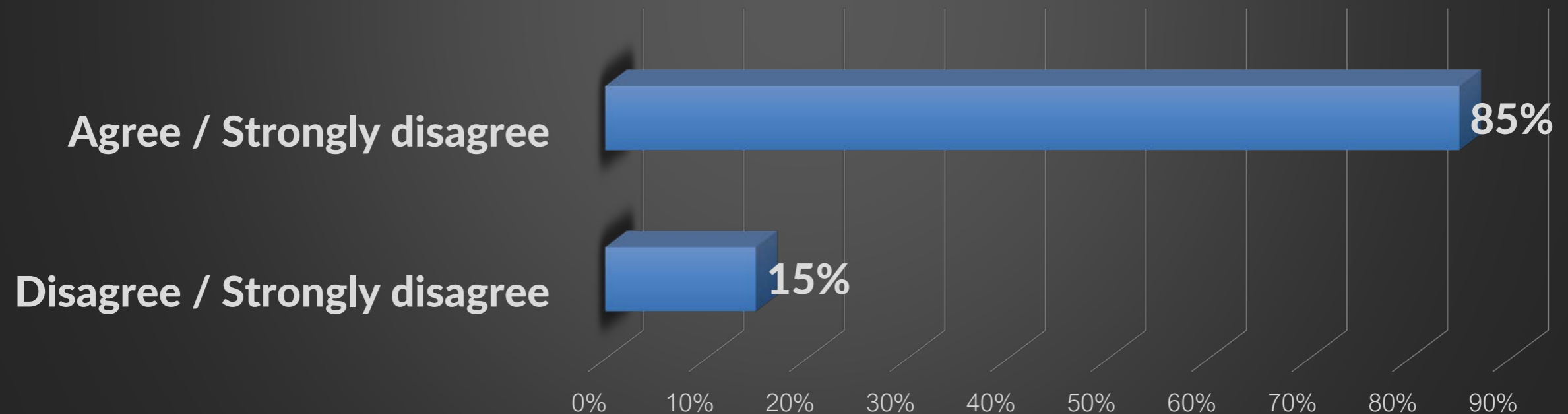

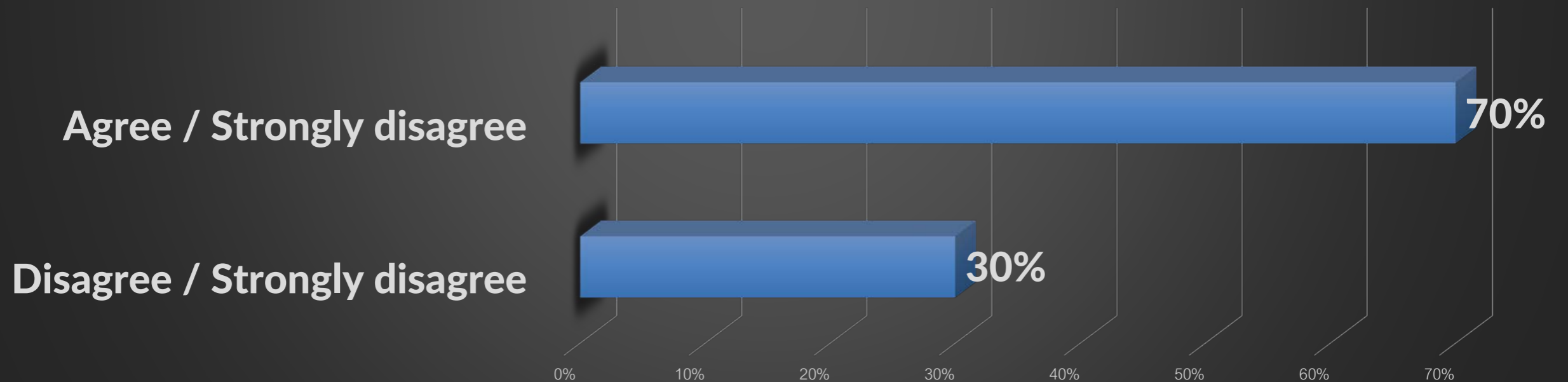
Statement 1

The nuclear regulator clearly expresses its expectations about the role an operator's security department should play in case of an accident.



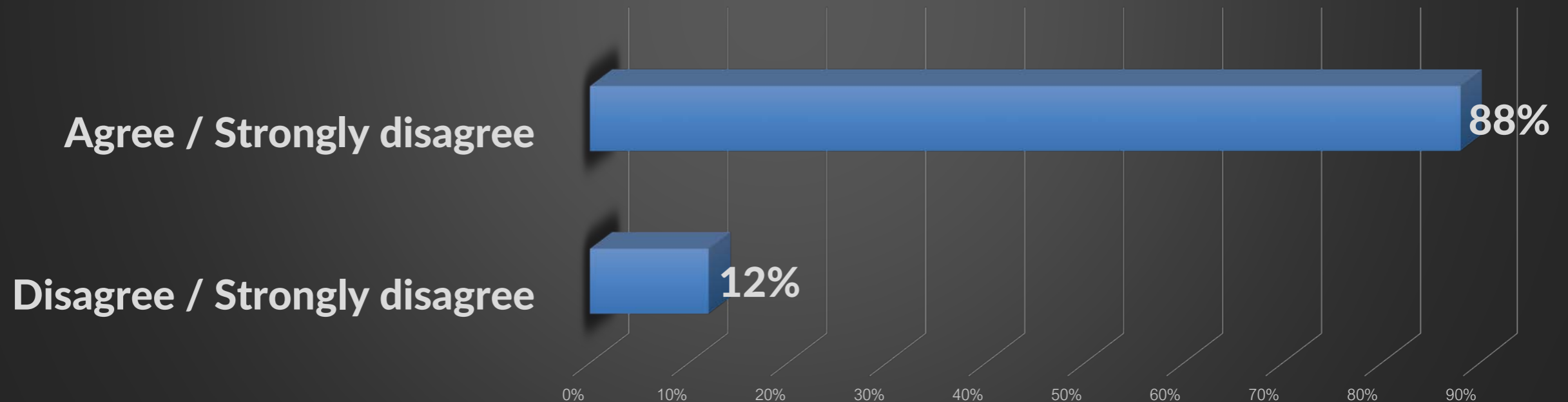
Statement 2

Security departments are consulted when response plans and procedures for accident are being prepared



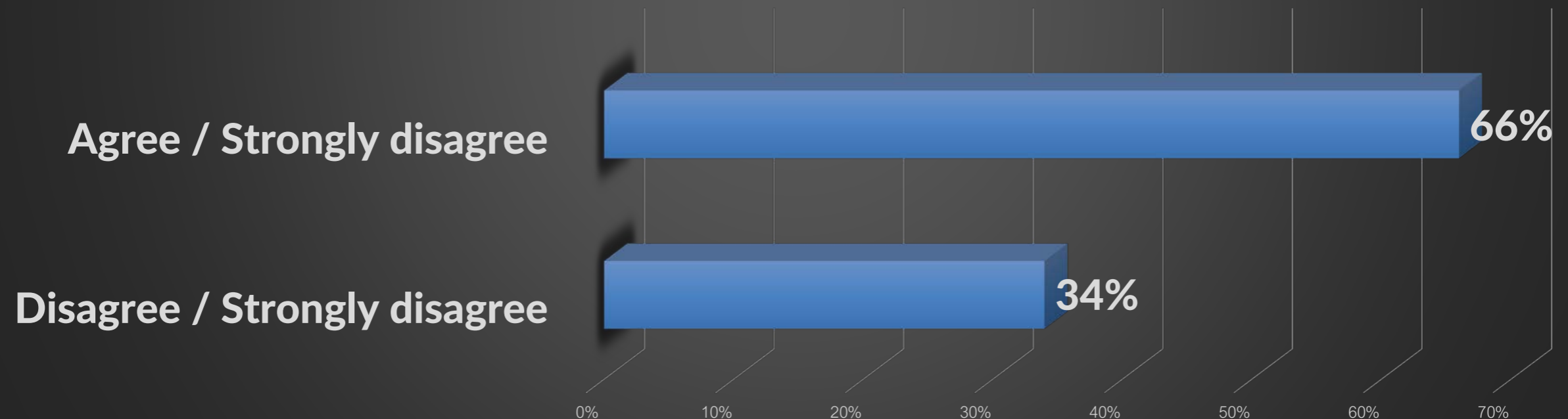
Statement 3

Security departments are aware of their roles and responsibilities in case of an accident and contribute effectively to response procedures.



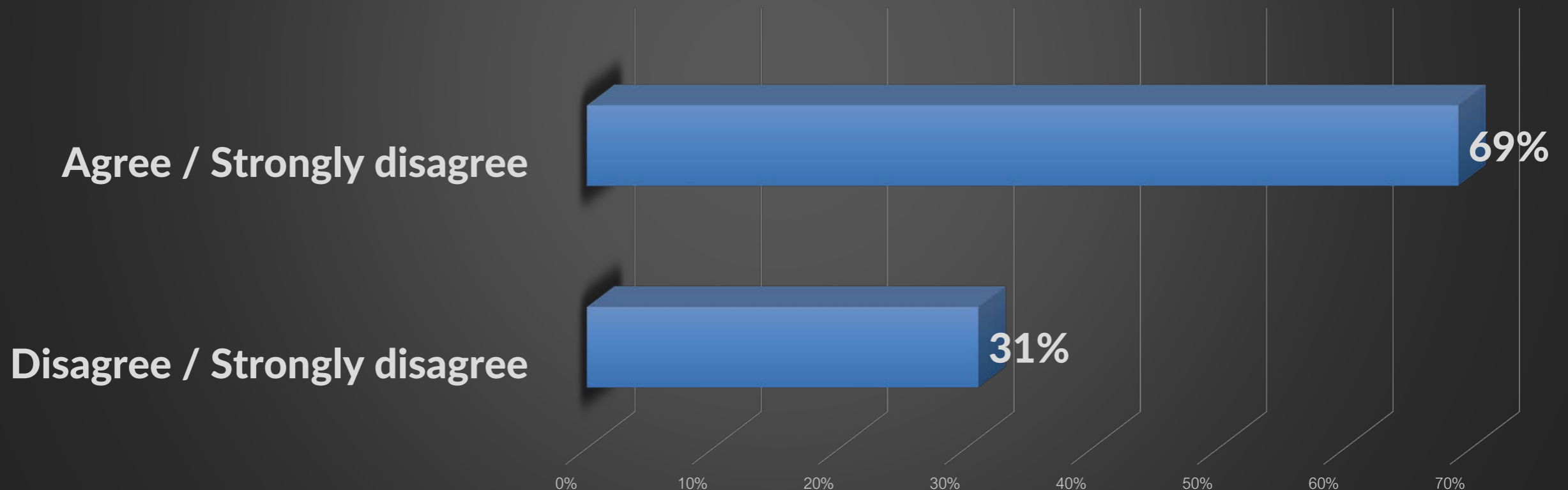
Statement 4

Security departments understand enough about radiological protection, the operation at facilities, and associated risks to respond effectively and safely.



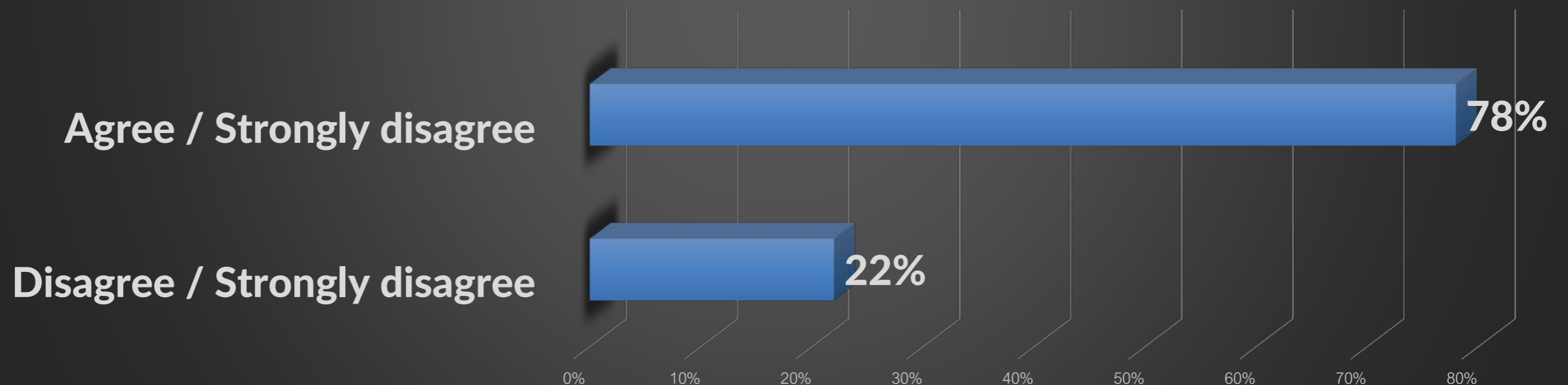
Statement 5

Security departments are always invited to participate in large-scale safety exercises.



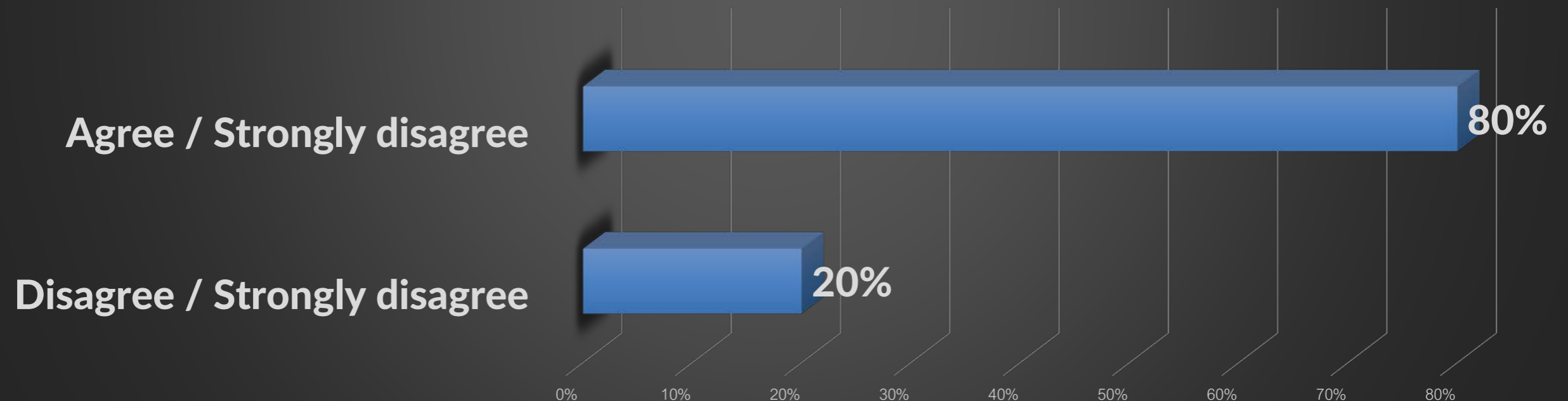
Statement 6

During exercises or in case of an accident, the coordination between the security department and other entities of the on-site emergency response team is smooth and effective.



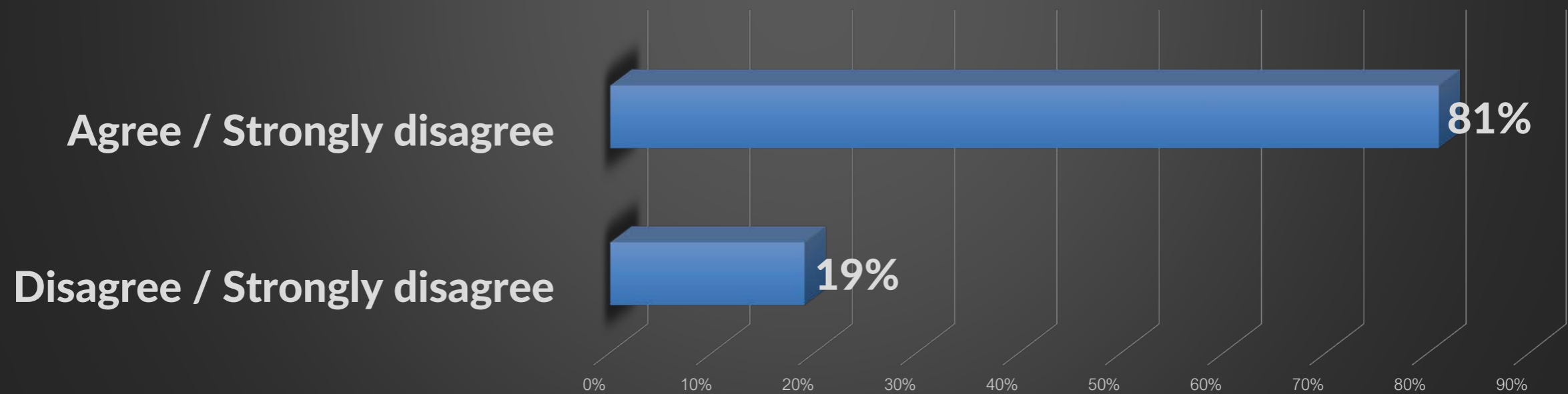
Statement 7

During exercises or in case of an accident, the integration of offsite security resources is smooth and effective.



Statement 8

There are mechanisms in place for identifying lessons learned and for sharing these lessons with both safety and security people.
